Re: Financial Crisis Inquiry Commission records involving Richard Bowen

Dear Mr. Bowen:

This letter follows up our phone calls of May 9th and 12th, 2017, in which we discussed certain records of the Financial Crisis Inquiry Commission (“Commission”), in particular, records involving you that are publicly available at the National Archives and Records Administration (“NARA”). You asked that NARA confirm that these records have been publicly released. This letter provides that confirmation.

The Commission was created to “examine the causes, domestic and global, of the current financial and economic crisis in the United States.” The Commission was established as part of the Fraud Enforcement and Recovery Act (Public Law 111-21) in May 2009. Following the conclusion of the Commission’s work, its records were transferred to NARA on February 13, 2011. The Commission requested that some of its records should start to become available five years later, and, to that end, in March 2016 a subset of those records were made publicly available.

Among the records made available are six items that NARA made available to you upon request:
